

A Costume Boutique

Jacques Brel is Alive and Well and Living in Paris was the musical we saw recently in Sarasota, Florida at THE PLAY-ERS THEATRE. The company has its own theater and has been in business for 74 years. The theatre itself is terrific, holding about 500 people on one floor. The lobby is large enough to have about 5 tables where people can drink coffee before the show and during intermission.

Of particular interest to me was their Costume Boutique, located in the lobby and open to the public 10-4 Monday to Friday and 10-1 on Saturday and, of course, at all performances. They sell (mostly women's clothes) costumes that they apparently no longer want as one means of raising money. Some are slightly wild, but all are attractive. It gave me the idea of our trying something like that (at least at performances) if we have any stuff (not only costumes) that would be salable. Seems like a good way to help "clean out" our closet. (I have a copy of their ad and one of their Minotaur-like newsletters, called The Players Marquee, if any one is interested. It has some other interesting ideas as well.)

Another thought (one we have tried before) is to ask audiences what plays/musicals they would like to see in the future. It may be helpful to our playreading committees.

By the way, the show was fun, but rather uneven. Of the 6 singers, only three were quite good. The setting was fine, although simple. The direction was only fair. He added six dancers to a show that does not have any dancers, and it was distracting, with very weak choreography. But Brel's music is so great that everyone had a good time. Act 2 beat the pants off Act 1, largely because of the performers finally coming to life and the director finding his way.

For a community theatre (they charged \$22 for the Sunday matinee we saw) it is a good group, somewhat more professional than we are because the performers have lots of other stage experience and training. Always fun to see how others do it.


