AACT 2021 Virtual Design Competition

The 2021 Virtual Design Competition—Best of the Decade will showcase community theatre creativity.

AACT-member theatres and their designers have entered projects occurring between July 1, 2011 and May 1, 2021, in any of five design categories, including Scenic, Lighting, Properties, Costume, and Special Design.

The virtual competition recognizes the coronavirus pandemic's impact on productions this past year, and AACT has accordingly expanded the eligibility period of submitted designs to the past 10 years. Each entry was a design created for an AACT-member theatre production, or a design created by an AACT individual member and used in a realized production by a community theatre.

In the past, designers provided displays to show their work at AACT-Fest. This year, designers have submitted all design display materials online. This allows for an enhanced adjudication experience, since ad-



judicators will have more time to review entries and compose feedback comments. Each entrant will receive a detailed commentary about their design and competition display.





AACT Virtual Youth Conference 2021

Building the next generation of arts leaders through the power of theatre

July 12 - 16, 2021, 10 - 2 daily, (Central Time)

The AACT Youth Theatre Conference is a week-long opportunity for youth to discover paths to leadership in their community theatres. That path could be through acting, directing, technical theatre, stage management, marketing or another avenue of interest. Unlike other conferences, this one cultivates individual interests, as well as connecting youth from across the nation. This dynamic virtual conference is open to students ages 12-18.

Work with other youth from around the country

Attendees will be divided into subgroups and work with an AACT intern to develop unique ideas on inclusion and equity within their home theatres, and around the country. These ideas/proposals will be presented to the other groups, and a representative from each will be invited to present the proposal to the AACT Board of Trustees.

Watch and discuss selected performances from AACTFest 2021

Each day, conference attendees will watch one of the shows performing at Virtual AACTFest 2021, and discuss the performance afterward. Since AACTFest 2021 is completely virtual and all 12 regional winners will be filmed, you'll have the opportunity to see some of the best community theatre from around the country.

Meet with professionals in the industry

Each day, students will have opportunities to hear from directors, set designers, costume designers, playwrights, and current Broadway performers. The presenters below are only some of those who will be sharing their experiences in professional theatre.

Recipient of many awards, his play You're Invited appeared in The Best American Short Plays 2010–2011. He is an alum of Carnegie Mellon University, New

York University's Tisch School of the Arts, and The Juilliard School, and is a former member of Primary Stages' Dorothy Strelsin New American Writers Group. Darren is also an artistic affiliate with American Blues Theater and Congo Square Theatre, and is a Core Writer for the Playwright's Center. He currently teaches playwriting at the University of Kansas.



Nikki Renée Daniels' Broadway appearances include Company (Jenny), The Book of Mormon (Nabulungi), The Gershwins' Porgy and Bess (Clara), Les Miserables (Fantine), Anything Goes, Promises, Promises, Aida, Nine, and Little Shop of Horrors.

On television, Nikki has appeared on *Chappelle's Show*, *Madam Secretary*, and *The Sound of Music: Live*. She has performed as a soloist at Carnegie Hall, and with symphony orchestras across the U.S. and Canada. She holds a B.F.A. in Musical Theatre from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music.



Jeff Kready has performed on Broadway as Monty Navarro in A Gentleman's Guide to Love and Murder, Tony Elliot in Billy Elliot the Musical, and Les Misérables (Jean Valjean understudy). Most recently, he was standby for the title role of Michael Dorsey/Dorothy Michaels in Tootsie. The conference hotel will be the Hyatt Regency Louisville, located in the heart of downtown and the tourism district, and within walking distance of the festival and conference locations.





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
