



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

Special Events, Training, and Competitions

Adjudication Training Workshop (limited to 30 people) - \$50

The success of any AACT Festival is in large part dependent upon the skill of its adjudicators. In this introductory workshop you'll learn what guidance comes from the festival handbook and what kind of autonomy is granted to adjudicators, as well as how to find the best people for the job.

Adjudication Training Seminar (limited to 15 people) - \$150

AACT Adjudication Training is an add-on event that will be held before (virtually) and in Louisville, during the national festival. The \$150 fee helps cover the costs of the five-plus days of intensive instruction. Festival registration is required. As a part of the curriculum, participants will also view AACTFest performances and receive additional training/assignments during festival week. Register for the training when you register for AACTFest.

Note: Adjudication Training 2023 Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Scholarships are available. AACT will be providing two scholarships to support and mentor theatre-makers of color.

Youth Conference (limited to 30 people) - \$40 aact.org/youthconf

The AACT Youth Theatre Conference is for youth who aspire to be leaders within the arts and theatre communities. Participants will be exposed to a line-up of powerful theatre performances from around the country, engage in educational workshops, receive mentoring and shadowing from arts professionals and take part in activities that are challenging and fun! The conference is open to ages 12-18.




Ground Transportation

Ben Cameron is AACTFest 2023 Keynote

Broadway veteran Ben Cameron's signature enthusiasm and razor wit will be front and center for his AACTFest 2023 keynote address Friday, June 16, at the Hyatt Regency Louisville. The keynote is open to AACTFest 2023 registrants only.

Cameron appeared in the original casts of *Wicked* and *Footloose*, as well in *Aida*, plus tours of *Sweet Charity* (opposite Molly Ringwald), *State Fair*, *Fame*, *The Who's Tommy*, and *Footloose*. Since hanging up his dance belt he has become one of Broadway's most beloved personalities as creator and host of the long-running variety show *Broadway Sessions* (2018 MAC Award), the *Broadway Buskers* concert series with the Times Square Alliance, the web series *Dance Captain Dance Attack* on BroadwayWorld.com, and the hit podcast, *The Broadway Cast with IHeartRadio Broadway*.

Cameron is also the MainStage host for BroadwayCon and was live-audience host for tapings of both *A Very Wicked Halloween* on NBC and *The Spongebob Musical* on Nickelodeon. He is a frequent face on PBS WNET, having hosted *Hamilton's America*, *Broadway on Thirteen Marathon*, and the *Downton Abbey New Year's Marathon*.

He recently made his return to the stage as the "Man in Chair" in *The Drowsy Chaperone* and starred as "Mr. Finch" in Broadway Green Alliance's online presentation of *You're a Green One, Mr. Finch* alongside Idina Menzel. He has enjoyed sold-out engagements of his one-man show, *Different Is Good,* in New York City and beyond.

Cameron is also a sought-after writer, director, performer, and choreographer, who travels the world, teaching high-energy theatre and dance masterclasses, and emceeing Onstage NY talent competitions.


His keynote will draw on his remarkable career, observations and insight, making for an entertaining and eye-opening experience.

AACTFest 2023 Adjudicators

The 2023 National AACTFest will feature experienced and nationally known adjudicators. Their comments on productions will be a learning experience for all participating company and audience members.



Gary Anderson is Producing Artistic Director of the Plowshares Theatre Company and a member of the National Advisory Committee of the Black Seed, a first-ever national strategic plan to create impact for Black theater institutions. A 2016 Kresge Artist Fellow, he is a

noted expert in Black Theatre. As a director, he has worked in Cleveland, Pittsburgh, Atlanta, and Houston. Among his awards are the Alain Locke Cultural Arts Award from The Friends of African and African American Art, Detroit Institute of Arts; Publisher's Award for Excellence - Between the Lines' Oscar Wilde Awards; the 2002 Michiganian of the Year Award from *The Detroit News*; and The Lawrence DeVine Award for Outstanding Contribution from *The Detroit Free Press*. Gary has served on the board of several local and national theatre organizations, including CultureSource (Michigan), Black Theatre Network (BTN), Theatre Communications Group (TCG), and the National Conference on African American Theatre (NCAAT).



Jeff Calhoun is a Tony nominee for Disney's *Newsies* and Deaf West Theater's *Big River*. He directed both the world premiere and international productions of Disney's *High School Musical: On Stage* and Disney's *High School Musical*

2: On Stage. His work on Broadway's Grease earned him a Tony Award Nomination for Best Choreography. Jeff is an associate artist at The Ford's Theater in Washington D.C., and serves on the Board of Directors for Covenant House International, a not-for-profit organization that shelters and cares for homeless and trafficked youth in 31 cities, across six countries. He recently directed *A Night of Covenant House Stars* (2020 and 2021) on AmazonPrime. He was a Keynote Speaker for AACTFest 2021.



Faye M. Price is the former Co-Artistic Producing Director of Pillsbury House Theatre and former Co-Director of the Pillsbury House Theatre Cultural Community Hub in Minneapolis, and was a dramaturg at the Guthrie Theater. As an actress, she has appeared at Mixed Blood,

the Guthrie, and Illusion theaters and is a company member of Penumbra Theater. Faye has served as an adjudicator for both AACT and the Minnesota Association of Community Theatres Festival, and was a dramaturgy respondent and judge for the Irene Ryan Acting Scholarship Audition for the Region V Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival. She is the recipient of the 2021 McKnight Foundation Distinguished Artist Award. Faye received her graduate degree from the University of Minnesota.



Rick St. Peter (Alternate Adjudicator) has been a director and educator in professional, academic and community theatre for 25 years. He was a participant in the LaMaMa/Umbria International Directors Symposium in Spoleto, Italy,

and is a recipient of a Princess Grace Foundation Theater Award. He served as the Associate Artistic Director of TheatreVirginia and Barksdale Theatre (now Virginia Repertory Theatre), and Artistic Director of the Actors Guild of Lexington, Kentucky. He received his M.F.A. in Stage Directing from Virginia Commonwealth University, and his Ph.D. in Fine Arts from Texas Tech University. He currently teaches in the I.B. Theatre program at Warwick High School and is an Adjunct Associate Professor of Theatre at Virginia's Christopher Newport University.

Ansbach Terrace Playhouse was founded in the 1950s and is part of the U.S. Army Europe Entertainment Program. The theatre serves U.S. soldiers, civilians, retirees, and family members stationed in Ansbach, Germany. The Ansbach Youth Theatre Troupe was founded in 2018 and performed *This Side of Heaven* at the 2019 AACT YouthFest in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. **ArmyEuropeEntertainment.com**

Blue Springs, Missouri (AACT Region V)

Mockingbird (Touring Version), adapted by Julie Jensen from the National Book Award-winning novel by Kathryn Erskine

Caitlin has Asperger's. To her the world is black and white; anything else is confusing. Caitlin's brother Devon helped her when things got confusing, but he was killed in a school shooting, and Caitlin's dad is too distraught to help. Caitlin wants everything to go back to normal but doesn't know how. **Blue Springs City Theatre** is an independent theatre organization celebrating its 36th year of bringing the gift of live theatre to Blue Springs and eastern Jackson County. Its mission is to support and further the performing arts in a welcoming, diverse, and inclusive environment, providing an outlet for artistic expression and enjoyment for all. **bluespringscitytheatre.com**



Star Center Theatre Gainesville, Florida (AACT Region IV)

Once on This Island JR., book and lyrics by Lynn Ahrens; music by Stephen Flaherty

Once on This Island JR. is an adaptation of Hans Christian Andersen's The Little Mermaid. Through almost nonstop song and dance, this full-hearted musical tells the story of Ti Moune, a peasant girl who rescues and falls in love with Daniel, a wealthy boy from the other side of her island. When Daniel is returned to his people, the fantastical gods who rule the island guide Ti Moune on a quest that will test the strength of her love against the powerful forces of prejudice, hatred, and even death.

Star Center Youth Theatre was founded in the summer of 2000 to provide arts education and performance opportunities for a diverse group of youth in the community. The small program was started without any resources or funding, but with a strong desire to expose and provide cultural opportunities to marginalized communities. Over the years the program has expanded to a full year of classes, workshops, and performances. The Star Center Theatre and the Founder have received national, regional, and statewide awards and recognitions for their work in its communities. **starcentertheater.org**

A Game, by Dennis E. Noble

Three people accept an invitation to take part in an experimental game. As the game progresses, we witness the drive that makes each human want to possess more than their neighbors—a drive that causes hatred ... and starts wars.

From contemporary plays to beloved classics, **Theatre33** strives to provide quality live productions that speak to the heart of audience members, evoke current social problems and eternal ethical questions, and tackle the complex matrix of human relationships. Since 2013, this bilingual theater has provided a unique platform for transplanted immigrants and nextgeneration Americans to retain and maintain their connection to history, literature, and language. 
Silent Sky, by Lauren Gunderson

Verona Area Community Theater (VACT) was founded in 1992 with the goal of providing affordable opportunities for children and adults to engage in and enhance their passions for all facets of theatre. Since that time the organization has grown from three productions to 10-12 productions each season. At least five productions are for youth only and in 2022 VACT began a senior theater program, completely cast with actors aged 55 and over. VACT is still run almost entirely by volunteers, from production to administration to cast, but its number-one priority is still to have fun. **vact.org**



An established highlight of the AACTFest national festival, the 2023 Monologue Competition will be no exception whether you're attending to perform, learn the ropes, or support your fellow actors. In fact, anyone can enter the Monologue Competition.

You can register for the Monologue Competition when you complete your festival registration online. If you're already registered, you may contact the AACT office at **info@aact.org** or **817-732-3177**. (There is a \$25 entry fee.) You can also sign up for the competition during AACTFest at the AACTFest registration desk in the lobby of the Louisville Hyatt Regency. However, the number of participants is limited, so early registration is recommended.

There are two categories, one for those age 18 and under, and one for those over 18. The winner in each category will receive a \$100 prize.

Monologues must be memorized and should come from a published play by an established writer, or a writer who has submitted a new script to a playwriting competition or for publication. You may present a piece of dramatic or comedic material that does not exceed two minutes to perform. No props, costumes, or effects of any kind are permitted. Participants will be assigned a preliminary-round monologue slot on either Wednesday, June 14, Thursday, June 15, or Friday, June 16. The festival adjudicators will select finalists from the preliminary rounds to perform in the Monologue Competition Finals, and the winner will be announced at Saturday's Awards Ceremony.

This is a unique opportunity to perform individually and receive feedback from an experienced acting teacher and adjudicator to sharpen your skills while you network with other artists.

The AACT 2023 Design Competition has gone hybrid, allowing entries to be displayed and adjudicated either online or in person during AACTFest 2023 in Louisville, Kentucky, this June.

Don't miss this wonderful opportunity to showcase your best design work and possibly take home a cash award. Go to **aact.org/design23** to view guidelines and display suggestions, as well as the rubric our adjudicators will use when evaluating design entries.

The five Design Competition categories include Scenic, Lighting, Properties, Costume, and Special Design.

Entries must be the work of an AACT Individual Member or be a design used for a production staged by an AACT Organizational Member. Designs must reflect productions staged between July 1, 2021, and June 30, 2023.

Adjudicators suggest that those interested should begin collecting sketches, photos, plans, and other materials that can be used in their entry. Entry forms, available at **aact.org/design23**, must be submitted by **June 12, 2023**.

Space allocation for in-person displays is limited, and entries will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis.

AACT will award a \$300 prize to the design chosen as Outstanding Overall Design. Competition adjudicators also have the option of awarding prizes of \$100 for Outstanding Design in each of the five categories.



Adjudication Seminar 2023

"The purpose of AACT adjudication is threefold: to accurately reflect to the performing company what has been successfully achieved; to outline reasonable steps that might be taken to enhance interpretation of the story; and, finally, to select which of the companies will receive awards. At its best, adjudication both educates and illuminates."

Over several festival cycles, AACT's Adjudication Seminar has provided adjudication training in both virtual and inperson formats. In 2023, AACT is combining the benefits of both formats in a hybrid model designed to maximize the experience.

The Adjudication Seminar will begin with six virtual sessions, two and a half hours each, scheduled March through May, 2023. Once participants have completed the virtual training, they will view the performances first-hand at the National Festival in Louisville, and respond to them with techniques learned in training, receiving feedback from the seminar instructor that is designed to polish both message and delivery. In-person sessions during the festival will also include how to negotiate with fellow adjudicators to determine award outcomes, and how to prepare for work as an adjudicator.

A Look into the Future

Theatre Tuscaloosa's World Premiere of Launch Day (Love Stories from the Year 2108)

It's the year 2108 and brilliant engineer Jada is eager to escape our troubled planet by blasting off on a risky mission to colonize another world. Ex-boyfriend Zegg, however, believes the Earth—and their relationship can be saved.

That's the first scene of Michael Higgins' *Launch Day* (*Love Stories from the Year 2108*), which received its AACT NewPlayFest world premiere October 21 at Theatre Tuscaloosa in Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

Zegg's mission is to convince Jada to stay—and hope that his new robotic arm doesn't ruin everything.

Under the direction of Tina Turley (who is also Theatre Tuscaloosa's Executive Producer) six couples navigate a high-tech but perilous future in this science-fiction comedy. In a series of connected stories, the couples encounter everything from spiteful computers to braincontrolling advertisements, to bizarre new animals. And as the launch clock counts down, they search for ways to make it all work.

"It is always exciting as a producer and director to get to do a new work," Turley said. "I have been a part of bringing new works to life in many of the various stages in my career. Michael Higgins' script is new and fresh, and it allows younger actors to really explore the arc of



a character and relationships. It's wonderful having the playwright there to see how his story has been brought to life."

Playwright Higgins notes that *Launch Day* was written so it could be performed on a budget, "but Tina Turley and her team blew me away by building an impressive set and making fun, clever props," he said. "When I wrote the play, I wasn't sure exactly what a 'proton hammer' would look like. Thanks to Tina and her designers, now I know."

Tuscaloosa audiences were not the only ones to be charmed by the show on opening night. In addition to the playwright and his wife, Lisa, also in attendance were Janet Saulter from the Jack K. Ayre and Frank Ayre Lee Theatre Foundation (which generously sponsors AACT NewPlayFest), Linda Habjan from Dramatic Publishing Company (which publishes anthologies of NewPlayFest's winning scripts), and AACT NewPlayFest Dramaturg Kathy Pingel. All said they were fortunate to be there to celebrate the partnership of Michael Higgins and Theatre Tuscaloosa and the creation of an exciting production.

As with all AACT NewPlayFest world premiere productions, a workshop with the director, cast, playwright, and AACT Dramaturg was held during the rehearsal period. Playwright Higgins called the AACT workshop process "invaluable," noting that he was able to "travel to Tuscaloosa for three nights of rehearsals, meet with Tina, and answer questions posed by her wonderful actors. At the end of the workshop, I think we all had a solid grasp of what the production could be."

Director Tina Turley had a similarly positive experience: "It was great to bounce ideas off of Michael, but he also allowed us to follow our vision of his play. I paid particular attention to his stage directions (not unlike when you direct Tennessee Williams), as well as his phrasing and word choices. What a gift this was for our actors—some of them students—who got to be a part of something larger than the usual process of producing a play, which is tough enough as it is." For Higgins, the highlight of the process was working with AACT Dramaturgs Kathy Pingel and David VanCleave. "Kathy is a fountain of keen observations and wise advice. Both she and David are the sort of smart collaborators who spot every issue and offer not just critiques, but possible solutions. At the same time, they're careful to leave all final script decisions in the hands of the playwright."

Turley thanked AACT "for creating the NewPlayFest itself, Dramatic Publishing for their support, and of course the Ayres Theatre Foundation and their generous contribution to the cause of bringing new work to life. It was hard work, and it was absolutely worth it. Theatre Tuscaloosa is so very thankful to be a part of a community of artists who love the theatre and want to see it thrive in the future!"

About the Playwright

Higgins is a former legal affairs reporter for the *Chicago Tribune* and has a law degree from the University of Pennsylvania. 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Memories and Milestones

Midland Community Theatre's World Premiere, Of Men and Cars

The AACT NewPlayFest world premiere of Jim Geoghan's *Of Men and Cars* opened October 21, 2022, at Midland Community Theatre (MCT) in Midland, Texas. The touching coming-of-age comedy opened to sold-out audiences and earned rave reviews from audiences and critics alike during its four-week run.

MCT is participating in NewPlayFest for the first time, but has a long history of presenting original works.

"For over 20 years, Midland Community Theatre hosted the McLaren Comedy Competition, and produced the winning production in our membership season," explains Executive Director Tim Jebsen. "With that competition on hiatus, MCT was seeking other ways to find and produce original works for our members. We were thrilled to be selected by AACT to participate in NewPlayFest, producing Jim Geoghan's original work."

Of Men and Cars chronicles a son's relationship with his World War II-veteran father (and their family Ford), based on the playwright's own life from the age of four through his late twenties.

"Yes, I stole my father's car and hit a tree when I was four. Yes, I hung out with Dad at bars when I was five," Geoghan has explained, referencing some of the script's opening moments. "We were pals. I learned a lot from Dad—like how to tell Mom that we did not go to a bar!"

Geoghan's gift of comedy has earned him multiple Emmy and Drama Desk Award nominations and is on full display in *Of Men and Cars.* It's his most personal play, balancing humor with the harsh realities of family relationships and growing up.

"As a child, I thought my father was amazing," he writes. "As a teenager, I discovered he was not so amazing and, worse than that, I let him know it. But as I became an adult, I began to realize I was also not as amazing as I thought, and I made up with my father before it was too late."

The AACT NewPlayFest process includes a three-day workshop during which the director and cast work directly with the playwright and the NewPlayFest dramaturg. The Q&A session with Jim Geoghan helped the actors see the real-life Jim and learn more about his process in writing the script. Perhaps the most enlightening moment came when Jeri Morgan, who plays Jim's mother (as well as other characters), asked why the role of Mother was so small. Geoghan's answer was direct and to the point: "Because I didn't have to say I was sorry to her."

As much as this is the playwright's own story, the themes are universal, which is why dramaturg Kathy Pingel arranged for a workshop session with social psychologist Dr. Caitlin Powell. This gave the actors the opportunity to explore motivation with questions like, how does a person stay married to someone who went to war a happy person but came back broken and angry? "The answer took into consideration the time period, the traditional role of women, and how long-term withholding of affection changes a person," Pingel explains. "In addition, Dr. Powell's knowledge of predictable behaviors in people who have had similar experiences gave actors insights and choices."

Other topics explored with Dr. Powell included the socially prescribed set of ideas of what it means to be a man, and developmental milestones in young people, such as the onset of abstract thinking that allows for the questioning of everyone and everything.

Executive Director Tim Jebsen said that the play's director, Ben Spencer, and his actors found the weekend workshop very helpful for their rehearsal process, welcoming the chance to dig deeper into the play and its characters.

Jim Geoghan's play *Only Kidding* ran off-Broadway for two years and was nominated for two Drama Desk Awards, including best play. *Light Sensitive* has had 80 productions and was nominated for the Joseph Jefferson Award in Chicago. Other plays include *King of City Island*, *Two Gentlemen of Corona*, and *Ug the Caveman Musical*, for which he wrote book and lyrics. Geoghan also writes and produces television. He created *The Suite Life of Zack and Cody* for the Disney Channel and was nominated twice for Emmy Awards. Other television credits include writing for *Family Matters*, *Silver Spoons*, and *Facts of Life*.

About Midland Community Theatre

Founded by Art Cole, Midland Community Theatre (MCT) marked its 75th anniversary in 2020. MCT produces musicals, comedies, dramas, mysteries, melodramas, and children's theatre in three performance spaces, along with diverse educational classes and programming. Storytelling Through Design

Six Tips for Big Designs on Any Budget

During her recent Virtual Masterclass, "Making Something Out of Nothing: Big Designs/Tiny Budgets," presenter Susanna Douthit shared tips and strategies for effective storytelling through design—regardless of budget. Below are some of her top tips, edited from her presentation.

On Volunteers

Greet them, welcome them, and introduce them to the team. I've seen it happen too many times that people volunteer their time and are never introduced to others in the theatre. If those in charge are too busy to do it, make *that* somebody's volunteer job—to introduce people and explain their jobs. It will go a long way in making volunteers feel welcome and want to return. It will also make them more effective in their own tasks.

30 Feet and Wiggling

Your workers will feel more successful if you explain (or remind them) of the "30 Feet and Wiggling" rule. Helpers can easily get bogged down in minor details and are then disappointed when they don't see it in the production. Audience attention is on actors who are 30 feet away and moving. Encourage your team to prioritize the things that are going to be seen and make a difference in the story.

Do Something, Even if it's Simple

Lights, sets, costumes, props, sound—these are the design elements to take the audience on their journey, so *use* them. You can bring in all of them at any budget, just be creative. One of the most beautiful twinkle effects I've ever seen was done by simply hanging filament line and wrapping tiny balls of tin foil around it. The movement of the actors would cause them to sway just slightly,

reflecting light in a beautiful and very inexpensive way. It was so simple but added so much to the audience's experience. Sound is another simple and effective way to move the audience. Whether it's music or sound effects that reflect the story or setting, it can really set the tone from the minute the audience enters the venue.

Tell Your Version of the Story

If you don't have the budget to do every aspect of a fullblown production, decide early which design category gets the lion's share of the time and money. Sometimes, by having a super-simple set and dedicating more money to elaborate costumes, you get more bang for your buck. Or vice versa. Determine what the story is really about and use *that* to drive your choices. Pick the thing that is the most important visually and put your efforts into that. Finesse the other elements in a simpler, pared-down way while still communicating your story and honoring *your* version of this world.

Indicate—Don't Re-create

Whether you are doing a period piece or a popular musical, don't try to recreate the historical era or the iconic scenes. Indicate them, instead.

The Color Wheel is your Friend, People!

Make effective use of color. If you want a color to really pop, light it with an analogous color. For example, If you want red or orange to pop, light it with purple. It's almost neon; it's fabulous. Just make sure your costume designer and lighting designer are communicating with each other and, whenever possible, test things out first!


"In addition to its work on behalf of international theatre, the honor also recognizes IMCOM staff's support of their communities," Clark-Roland said.



Entries are accepted in two categories: English as a First Language and English as a Second Language. The two first prizes can come from either category.






